# Town to look into old AMC as rental housing

During a short and productive monthly Town of Franklin Council meeting held Monday, Oct. 3, a proclamation of October as Colonial Heritage Month was approved unanimously. The proclamation states in part that "...National Colonial Heritage Month recalls the first courageous settlers who arrived in America and who influenced much of the direction and formation of our country."

Shelah Portoukalian, historian of the Lost Colony Chapter, Colonial Dames XVII Century in Franklin, was on hand for Mayor Jack Horton's reading of the proclamation. The Colonial Dames Society is a women's organization made up of lineal descendants of an ancestor who lived and served prior to 1701 in one of the original colonies, and strives to preserve the memories of those persons.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Folk Heritage Association of Macon County, carried over from September, that involved acceptance of the Women's History Trail's (WHT) donation of the Sowing the Seeds of the Future sculpture. According to Town Attorney John Henning Jr., "The MOU is an agreement to handle where it is going to be placed, how the town will manage it, and what a great asset it will be. Henning further offered, "Especially with some remembrance of Ms. Barbara McRae ... she talked about this five or six years ago. She is missed tonight and it would be wonderful if she could have been here to see this. It is another step along the path she started us down many years ago."

Also on hand were WHT project leaders Mary Polanski and Marty Greeble.

"I see this as an exciting moment ... it's uplifting and positive and I think it will reverberate in this way for many years," Polanski commented on the project. Mayor Horton also stated after visiting the sculptor's studio, "I was particularly impressed with the work the sculptor has done." He also opined that "people will be coming to Franklin to see this sculpture; it will garner national attention."

#### Old AMC to become rental housing?

An MOU between the Town Council and Givens Estates Inc., a North Carolina nonprofit corporation, was also approved. Dogwood Health Trust awarded a \$267,500 grant to the Town for the purpose of procuring services to determine the feasibility of converting the Angel Medical Center

property to affordable rental housing. The housing will be set aside specifically for seniors ages 55 or older. The property formerly served as the Franklin hospital but with the opening of the new Angel Medical Center is now vacant. The Town seeks assistance and Givens has expertise working with providers of such services. The MOU will be effective through April 1, 2023.

#### FPD adds to its ranks

In other business, on behalf of Chief of Police Bill Harrell, Capt. Devin Holland announced the addition of Officer Cody Tiger to the Franklin Police Department. According to Holland, hiring Tiger, one of two recent hires, almost completes efforts to round out the Franklin police force. Three candidates are currently in training who will soon bring the police force's total back up to full complement.


#### Town wins water turbidity award

Bill Deal, wastewater supervisor for the Town of Franklin, presented Tony Nichols as the new meter reader for the Public Works department. Deal also recognized Bobby Clubb, plant superintendent for the town's water treatment, with a North Carolina Area Wide Optimization Program Turbidity Award. Turbidity is an optical characteristic of water and is a measurement of the amount of light that is scattered by material in the water when a light is shined through the water sample. Excessive turbidity may also represent a health concern because of potential waterborne disease outbreaks. The award is the fourth such one garnered by the department – a testament to its high standards and attention to detail.

The next Town Council meeting is set for Nov. 7, at 6 p.m.





## Gem & Mineral Society inducts new officers, board members





## Tis the season for sorghum syrup-making

Harvey Fouts had this to say on "syrup-making day," at his family homeplace: "This is living history ... a window to the past.'

Fouts's extensive family has been growing and harvesting sorghum cane and making sorghum syrup for more than 100 years.

Fall is traditionally the time of year when the sugar juice content of the tall 8-10 foot sorghum cane stalks reads 15.5 to 16.5 degrees on a Brix hydrometer or a sugar refractometer. The cane has to be cut and then a week or so later the process of syrup-making commences.

Sharon Fouts Taylor, former director of Mainspring Conservation Trust, grew up experiencing the tradition.


"The family tradition of making sorghum every year has been an important part of making us a family. There were nine children in my father's generation. Many left the area and raised their children somewhere else, and many of those children now have their own families. Having this tradition of bringing everyone together, from Sorghum cane, stacked high in an open trailer, is taken off near and far, creates a sense of belonging to the larger family," said Taylor.

Sorghum syrup is a sweetener with about the same calories as honey but more calories per tablespoon than molasses, maple syrup, or white sugar. Syrup is thick, brown, and sticky, and although some people perceive sorghum is the same as molasses, it is not. Molasses is made from crushed

sugar cane or sugar beets. The reason sorghum syrup became popular in Western North Carolina during the 18th and 19th centuries was because real maple syrup – and sometimes sugar – was both expensive and often difficult to acquire.

> Sorghum cane, however, grows well in the region. And for more than a century, the Fouts family has been growing sorghum cane on about a half-acre. For the past several years, they plant mostly Dalevariety sorghum seeds, acquired by the pound from Mississippi State University.

To make the sorghum syrup each fall, a grinding mill presses the juice out of the cane, which is fed by hand from an open trailer of cane stacked high. Juice is pumped to a holding vat before flowing to the boiler, where it heats for around four hours so water can evaporate and leave behind the edible syrup. During the heating process impurities are "skimmed" off of the juice. The same wooden paddle, which hangs under an open metal shed at the Fouts's family property, has been used for 100 years to push the resulting syrup into a spigot so mason jars can be filled. Approximately 15 gallons of syrup can be acquired from 100 gallons of sorghum cane juice.

and butter, stir it up together and spoon it onto a hot biscuit. That combination is still as good as any dessert I've ever had."

She added, "The syrup is delicious, but having it is far secondary to the sense of belonging and groundedness that joining together as a family brings. Of course, as my generation ages, it's difficult to keep the tradition going. There's a lot of field work before the cane is ready for the mill. The younger

piece by piece to feed into a grinding mill, which presses the

juice out of the cane into a holding vat.

generation is busy building their own lives, working and raising kids, but I hope they see value in having this connection to multiple family generations and the land of their ancestors."

While the Fouts's farm-made sorghum syrup is distributed to extended family members and is not sold, some local produce stands and country-type stores do sell it.

"The Fouts Family Syrup Book" includes "a collection of stories, photographs, and recipes" that convey the process and tradition of sorghum syrup making. Recipes include Syrup Taffy and Ginger Crinkles.

#### **Syrup Taffy**

1 cup sorghum syrup

1 cup brown sugar

1 cup warm water

3 TBS vinegar

3 TBS butter

Put butter, sugar, water, and vinegar into a saucepan and stir. Boil until very brittle when dropped into cold water. Add butter to mixture, remove from stove

and pour onto buttered plate. When cool enough to handle, butter hands and pull until light brown. Pull into oblong strips and cut with scissors. Place on plate until it hardens.

#### **Ginger Crinkles**

2/3 cup vegetable oil

1 cup sugar

1 egg

4 TBS sorghum syrup

2 cups all-purpose flour

2 tsp baking soda

½ tsp salt

1 tsp cinnamon 1 tsp ginger ½ cup sugar for dipping

Mix first four ingredients. Sift dry ingredients and add to first four ingredients. Drop by teaspoon into sugar and roll. Bake for 15 minutes on ungreased cookie sheet.





## The Legislative Review

N.C. Rep. Karl Gillespie

In this week's edition of The Legislative Review, the focus is on the topic of salary and pay raises, as important aspects of North Carolina's budget.

#### Salary and pay raise highlights in the state budget

- 6% average pay raise for state employees over the biennium.
- 9.1% average pay raise for teachers over the biennium.
- 5.7% increase in the starting salary for entry level teachers.
- 4% pay raise for non-certified school support staff or an increase to \$15/hour, whichever is higher.

- \$80 million for state agencies to provide targeted salary increases to attract and retain employees.
- Adds \$70 million to the state-funded teacher salary supplement for low-wealth counties (\$170 million total over the biennium).
- 4% one-time retiree supplement bonus over the bien-

#### Salary adjustments from the 2022 budget

The 2022 Appropriations Act appropriates an additional \$368.9 million in FY 2022-23 to augment the salary increases enacted in the 2021 Appropriations Act for State employees and State-funded local employees. When combined with the \$383.8 million in salary increases appropriated in the 2021 Appropriations Act for FY 2022-23, the total net appropriation for FY 2022-23 salary increases is \$752.7 million.

Most State employees and Community College employees receive a 3.5% across-the-board salary increase with the potential to receive additional salary increases from Labor Market Salary Reserve (LMSR) funds appropriated to their respective agency. The LMSR funds are equal to approximately 1% of the agency's respective salary base and are provided to allow agencies the discretion to target larger salary increases to priority positions. Employees in positions that either have a salary set in law or are paid on an experience-based salary schedule receive a 4.5% across-the-board salary increase but are ineligible for LMSR funded salary increases.

#### Benefits adjustments

The 2022 Appropriations Act provides an allocation of \$36 million to the Retiree Supplement Reserve to

In a nation where we are striving to become one out of the many, there inevitably will be friction. That's OK. None of us want to live in a world where everyone agrees on everything all the time.

But as we enter our season of democracy, I am asking you for help. As we go to vote this fall, I am asking for your patience, your grace, and your assistance to ensure that voting in elections remains the cornerstone of our democracy.

As Americans, we argue. We disagree about how high our taxes should be, or what should be taught in our schools. We are at odds over the proper role of government in our lives and how we can do best by our least fortunate citizens. Like you, I watch the news and see a vehement and dogged polarization creeping into every facet of our lives. A recent University of Chicago poll found that three out of four of us think that members of the other political party "are generally bullies who want to impose their beliefs on those who disagree." Nearly half of us feel like "strangers in our own country" and one out of every four of us has lost a friend over differing political views. Astonishingly, nearly one in four of us - Republicans and Democrats - believe it may "soon be necessary to take up arms" against our own government.

As election administrators our job is straightforward: to ensure that our elections are secure, accessible, and fair. The public servants who conduct elections, both at the state level and at each county, are highly trained and dedicated. They are committed to running elections impartially. You may have seen these folks in the grocery store or at church. They may live on your street. They work year-round to make sure we are ready for you to be able to cast your vote in local, state, and federal elections. With over 7 million registered voters and over 5.5 million votes cast in the last presidential election, making voting happen is no small task. During election season, our election professionals must train thousands more of your fellow citizens, representing both major parties, to work the polls. Everyone involved works impossibly long hours to make sure you can vote.

Because of the high level of conflict and polarization right now, those of us in the Election Administration community are worried. Some of us are Republicans, some are Democrats, but all of us are Americans first. We want what you want. We want a thriving democracy where our differences are settled at the ballot box and where we can continue to seek that more perfect union. We will do our level best to make sure your voting experience is secure, accessible, and fair. In return, I hope that you will show up to vote and have faith in your neighbors and friends who are conducting the voting process.

## What's new on the plateau

The town was spared the remnants of Tropical Storm Ian this past weekend. Earlier in the week town staff and I had worried that we might have very heavy rains and high winds in the 50 to 80 mph range. If that had occurred power lines would have most likely gone down.

As I have stated on numerous occasions, when we lose power, patience should be everyone's first

level of response. Like with the past weekend our crews were on standby, and when the town did have a power outage on Sunday morning, they responded quickly to get it back on. We live in a mountainous forest with tremendous amounts of rain, snow and strong winds, so power outages are inevitable.

I have also emphasized that residents should not overburden the 911 emergency system with calls reporting outages as soon as they occur. Our electric department has one of the fastest response systems available. During inclement weather crews are on standby and in some instances actually staying in the buildings at the town yard.

Instead of calling 911, please call after hours (828) 526-4131 to report outages if power has been out for a long period of time. The 4131 number is the nonemergency dispatch number for Macon County. Dispatchers will then radio our crews and report the problem. During regular business hours please call town hall at (828) 526-2118 to report outages. Our staff also has radios in order to contact electrical crews.

This past year our staff researched and explored contracting with a second party provider to create an after-hours call center. Initial inquiries were very promising, but when it got to the level of implementation several problems were identified. The companies we contacted normally serve large systems and municipalities, and Highlands did not qualify for the scale these companies normally serve. We also discovered they insisted on package contracts where they would handle all utility billing, service requests and service issues.

Another big problem was the interface with our electric crews. We have to rely on radios in order to communicate over the extreme topography of Highlands. This challenge would be problematic if the call center was somewhere like Lincoln, Nebraska or Boise, Idaho. Since our town already offers a direct service for billing and requests, coupled with the communications challenges, the staff was hesitant to em-



## FHS Panthers football, tennis tally wins

The threat of Hurricane Ian moved Franklin High School's (FHS) football game vs. the Pisgah Black Bears to Thursday, Sept. 28, instead of Friday. The Panthers, coming off a disappointing 31-7 loss at Tuscola, prevailed 23-21 in a hard fought contest.

The FHS women's tennis team also had a match vs. East Henderson on the same day and ran their season record to 12-0 with 10 of the wins in conference. Coach Heather Bell, who has led the Lady Panthers for nine years, pointed out that "we are reaping the benefits of a middle school training program for the first time this year." Similar to an approach undertaken by the volleyball program several years back, Bell began to focus on building a program for 6th, 7th and 8th grade girls, resulting in greater familiarity and higher skill levels when entering their freshman year.

The varsity team is composed of 13 players: four freshmen, three sophomores, four juniors, and two seniors. In doubles play, Alyssa Smith (#1 seed) and Kate Phillips (#2 seed) remain undefeated at the #1 position while Abigail Angel (#3 seed), is 7-4 in singles play and 6-1 at the #2 po-

For Panther football, Ty Handley (#15) is proving to be a force to reckon with scoring three touchdowns and grabbing an impressive interception. Of FHS' 323 total yards, 252 came on the ground: from Handley 107 yards; Brayden Watts (#14) with 89 yards; and, quarterback Davis Anders (#12) with 56 yards.

All three senior players have factored significantly in the Panthers' success thus far this season. Sophomore kicker Daniel Riddle (#17) contributed to the scoring, making one field goal of 28 yards and two of three points after touchdown. He also totaled 156 yards in kickoffs.




## Fiber artist featured at library in October



## Chase Elliott grabs thrilling Talladega victory, advances in **NASCAR Cup Series playoffs**

TALLADEGA, Ala. – Always the unquestionable fan favorite at NASCAR's famed Talladega (Ala.) Superspeedway, Georgia-native Chase Elliott made a last-lap pass to claim the NASCAR Cup Series YellaWood 500 victory Sunday afternoon - having to better one of his best friends, Ryan Blaney, to earn the first automatic bid into the next round of the 2022 NASCAR Cup Series Playoffs.

With a lap to go, Elliott pulled his No. 9 Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet from the bottom lane to the top lane and got a huge push from behind by Petty GMS Racing driver Erik Jones - the momentum enough to edge fellow Playoff competitor Blaney by a slight .046-second at the line and give him a chance to hoist his series-best fifth trophy of the season; 18th of his seven-year NASCAR Cup Series career.

"Moments like that, you have to really cherish and you guys are what makes this special to me," Elliott, 26, told the cheering fans. "So, thank you sincerely, I really appreciate it."

"It was a wild last couple laps. I wasn't super crazy about being on the bottom and fortunately I got just clear enough off of [Turn] 2 to slide up in front of Erik [Jones] and he gave me some great shoves, obviously a Team Chevy partner there. Just had a good enough run to get out front and then was able to stay far enough in front of Ryan [Blaney] at the line to get it done.

"These things are so so hard to win, you gotta enjoy them and just appreciate everyone's effort today."

Former Daytona 500 winner Michael McDowell was third, followed by two more Playoff drivers, Trackhouse Racing's Ross Chastain and Joe Gibbs Racing's Denny

Chastain and Stewart-Haas Racing's Aric Almirola led the most laps on the day – each out front 36 laps – in an afternoon that featured the most lead changes of the season (57) set by 17 different drivers.

Although it was a typically dramatic superspeedway ending, the action was tame by Talladega standards. Only one of the six caution periods was for a multi-car accident. Two were scheduled "stage breaks" and the other two for single car incidents. The final caution -which set up the two-lap shootout ending – came for Daniel Hemric's stalled car on pit

That bunched up the field again and ultimately positioned Elliott (who restarted on the inside of the third row) to make his run forward. Blaney, who led 31 laps in the No. 12 Penske Racing Ford, had been trading the lead with Jones in the laps immediately before that final caution flag.

"I thought about it," Blaney said, of making a different move for the lead. "The second lane was kind of the strongest, definitely the second half of the race. And I thought about (throwing a block on Elliott) but when you go to the middle without a Ford or teammate behind you, the chances of getting split are

"As much as I trust Chase, I don't trust him enough for him not to take me three-wide and leave me in the middle so I chose to stay down in front of (fellow Ford driver) Michael (Mc-Dowell). He was awesome at pushing me on the last restart and giving me great shots. Just a little bit too late."

It was a big boost for Elliott, who had a rough outing last week in the opening race of this Playoff round in Texas. Elliott crashed and finished 32nd and came into Talladega ranked eighth – after earning a regular season championship and leading the standings for a season-best 23 weeks prior to Sunday.

The opening four 2022 Playoff races have been won by non-Playoff drivers – an unprecedented occurrence. So Elliott's advancement to the next round is the first "automatic" move by

not been able to lead that next lap to earn the big trophy. On Saturday, the veteran waited and pulled

the white flag lap on a superspeedway track and

ahead of the field in the final feet coming to the Sparks 300 checkered flag at Talladega (Ala.) Superspeedway and edged 19-year old Sam Mayer by .015-second – about three feet - in a photo finish to earn his first NASCAR Xfinity Series win at NASCAR's biggest track.

It marked the regular season champ Allmendinger's fourth victory in the No. 16 Kaulig

Racing Chevrolet this season and first ever at a superspeedway venue. Most importantly, the win - coming in the second race of the opening round of the Playoffs - is an automatic ticket to the next round of Xfinity Series Playoff competition.

"Let's gooooooo," an absolutely elated Allmendinger screamed into the grandstands after climbing out of his car and accepting the checkered flag at the iconic track.

"Gosh, we've been so close to winning one (superspeedway race) and I feel like I keep giving them away. Thought I might have given it away. I'm still learning ... But honestly, all credit to (Kaulig teammate) Landon Cassill.

"He kept shoving me. He stuck with me. That's what is great about Kaulig Racing, when you have teammates like Landon and Daniel (Hemric) that you know wherever you go, they'll go with you. So thank you Landon.

"Man, I just wanted to win a superspeedway and finally got it," added a grinning Allmendinger, who now claims 14 career Xfinity Series victories.

Cassill finished third, followed by Ryan Sieg and JR Motorsports driver Josh Berry - all Playoff contenders. Parker Kligerman was sixth, followed by Playoff drivers Ty Gibbs, Daniel Hemric, Brandon Jones and Noah Gragson.

It marked quite the comeback for Gibbs, who qualified on the front row, but was involved in the only on-track yellow flag for an incident on the afternoon. The Joe Gibbs Racing driver's No. 54 Toyota was tagged from behind by Justin Allgaier while racing in a tight pack up front only three laps into the 113-lap



a Playoff-eligible driver.

Beyond Elliott, Blaney now leads the points standings – 32 points ahead of Sunoco Rookie of the Year candidate Austin Cindric in ninth place with the top eight drivers advancing to the Round of 8 next Playoff round.

Chastain is ranked third, followed by Hamlin and Penske Racing's Joey Logano, who finished 27th on Sunday. Reigning NASCAR Cup Series champion, Hendrick Motorsports' driver Kyle Larson – who finished 18th at Talladega – is ranked sixth in the standings, followed by Trackhouse Racing's Daniel Suarez and Stewart-Haas Racing's Chase Briscoe in that final eighth place position. Cindric is tied with Briscoe in points. William Byron (-11), Christopher Bell (-33) and Alex Bowman (-54) complete the current Playoff 12.

The Hendrick Motorsports driver Bowman did not race this week as he is recovering from concussion-like symptoms after an accident in Texas last week. Team owner Rick Hendrick said Bowman would be re-examined by doctors this week in hopes of getting clearance to return to competition.

The next race, the Bank of America ROVAL 400, is Sunday at the Charlotte Motor Speedway ROVAL  $\,-$  the final road course event of the season. Larson is the defending race winner. Blaney won the inaugural race at the Charlotte ROVAL and Elliott is a two-time winner there as well (2019 and 2020).

AJ Allmendinger earns elusive superspeedway win, advances TALLADEGA, Ala. – Three times A.J. Allmendinger has led

race. Gibbs spun out but was remarkably untouched by any other car.

A quick pit stop and impressive pit strategy later, Gibbs was running around the Top-10 in the closing laps of the race and managed to recover to that seventh place final effort.

Gragson, driver of the No. 9 JR Motorsports Chevrolet, was looking to become the first driver in NASCAR Xfinity Series history to win five consecutive races and was running among the Top-3 with 10 laps to go.

His ultimate move forward for the win in the closing laps was blocked finishing 10th. Although just short of that historic victory nod, he had already earned his automatic ticket to the Playoffs second round by virtue of his victory last week at Texas (his seventh on the season and fourth in a row).

Polesitter and series rookie Austin Hill, who swept the two stage wins and for the second straight race led the most laps – 60 on Saturday – also dropped out of the lead group in the waning laps to the checkered flag. He finished 14th.

With Allmendinger and Gragson having earned automatic bids in ton the next round of the Playoffs, Gibbs (-21) and Hill (-27) are ranked third and fourth in the standings, followed by Berry, Allgaier - who finished 15th Saturday – Mayer and Sieg in that eighth and final transfer position.

Defending series champion Hemric (-6), Brandon Jones (-10), Riley Herbst (-10) and Jeremy Clements (-47) are ranked ninth through 12th heading into the final race of this Playoff round.

Matt DiBenedetto wins at Talladega, his first career NASCAR National Series win

TALLADEGA, Ala. - It took a lot of last lap gumption on the Talladega (Ala.) Superspeedway high banks and an official "race finish review" afterward, but longtime competitor Matt DiBenedetto earned his first NASCAR national series race victory in Saturday's Chevy Silverado 250 NASCAR Camping World Truck Series race.

Because the race ended under caution, NASCAR officials reviewed video to determine who was leading when an accident froze the field coming to the checkered flag. Ultimately, it marked the first and only lap the former NASCAR Cup Series driver DiBenedetto

had ever led in the truck series - and it delivered his first trophy.

NASCAR Camping World Truck Series championship competitor Ben Rhodes was scored runner-up with young rookie - and Alabama native – Bret Holmes in third place.

It marked the fifth consecutive Talladega truck race that the winner led only the last lap.

"Oh man, it's been such a long time coming," said the 31-year old Californian DiBenedetto, who recently renewed his contract with the No. 25 Rackley WAR Chevrolet team. "I'm so thankful."

It was a typically competitive afternoon at Talladega - with 11 leaders and 25 lead changes in the 95-lap race – only to end with a dramatic push for the checkered flag in a green-white-checkered overtime finish.

The 25-year old Holmes - the 2020 ARCA Menards Series champion - led the white flag lap and thought he was ahead when the final yellow and checkered flags waved and pulled up to the trophy stand, where DiBenedetto later pulled alongside.

Ryan Preece and Playoff driver Christian Eckes rounded out the Top-5. Hailie Deegan earned a career best sixth-place finish. Chase Purdy, Colby Howard, Parker Kligerman and

Tyler Ankrum rounded out the Top-10.

Jordan Anderson, who emerged from a fiery single-truck crash on Lap 19, was transported to a local hospital where he was reported awake and alert.

As for the Playoffs, only Rhodes and Eckes finished among the Top-10. With Ty Majeski's win at Bristol, he is the only driver to have already secured a position in the Championship 4.

Chandler Smith was 14th, Zane Smith, 17th and Stewart Friesen was 20th. Majeski finished 23rd and polesitter John Hunter Nemechek who won Stage 1 – was 24th.

The Playoff standings continue to be very tight beyond Majeski. Chandler Smith holds a

12-point edge on Zane Smith with reigning series champion Ben Rhodes in fourth position, 27 points behind Chandler Smith.

Eckes and Friesen are both three points behind Rhodes. Nemechek is five points from the cutoff line and Grant Enfinger, who was involved in an accident on Saturday afternoon is now 26 points behind Rhodes.

The final Playoff race to decide which four drivers advance to the series Championship will be Oct. 22 at Homestead-Miami Speedway (1 p.m. ET, FS1, MRN, SiriusXM NASCAR Radio). The trucks last raced at the South Florida track in June, 2020 where Kyle Busch earned his third series win at the track.






