Macon County librarian has seen many changes over her three-decade tenure

Karen Wallace has a large stack of books and a reading list "a mile long." And, since the end of 2022 will mark the end of her more than 30-year career as a librarian, retirement years will afford her time to enjoy reading, as well as other pursuits, such as hiking and traveling.

The native New Englander attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and, other than a stint as a librarian in Louisiana, has resided in the state.

Wallace has not just overseen the Macon County library, but since 2006, has been the Fontana Regional Director, the scope of which includes six libraries in three counties – In Macon, the Macon County Public Library, Hudson Library in Highlands, the Nantahala Community Library; in Jackson County, the Jackson County Public Library and the Albert Carlton-Cashiers Community Library; and in Swain County, the Marianna Black Library.

In Macon County, she has helped oversee the building of the current library in Franklin, the renovation and expansion of the Hudson Library in Highlands, the logistics in play to eventually move the Nantahala library into a new facility, and more.

"There have been a number of building-related projects that I've been involved in," she explained. "Moving the Macon County Library from the [Senior Services] center [on Wayah Street] involved doubling the library space, hiring more staff, and realizing a facility that welcomes people. This library offers space to gather in the central part, which we call the 'living room' ... to relax, to feel comfortable." Wallace has also experienced significant technological

changes during her almost four decades in library services.

"I've worn a lot of hats, and when I first started as a librarian there was no Internet. We used a punch machine to check out books. In 1995, I remember going to training to learn about what the World Wide Web was. Within a year, we had dial-up service in the library."

Wallace said a highlight of her career has been promoting the library as not only a place to read, learn, and enjoy resources, but also to glean information about how to utilize technology. She pointed out that library staff is trained to help people navigate new devices, which is especially needed after Christmas.

"For me and for the staff, having an opportunity to help bring people together, and to help them find what they're looking for – that's always been satisfying," said Wallace.

The main challenge she has had to face is pushback regarding some resources.

"If I pull any book off of a shelf, someone will have an objection to it," she said. "Not everyone will approve or value all of what a library offers. And some people don't agree about what tax dollars should be spent on. But it's about people's choice regarding what to read, view, and participate in."

In early December, Wallace received the 2022 N.C. Public Library Director of the Year Award for her long-time efforts. Although Wallace was "honored," the timing made the

achievement bittersweet in that her husband of 38 years, Brett Deal, had just passed away the previous month.


Stepping into Wallace's shoes is Abby Hardison, originally from Georgia, who became the Macon County librarian in mid-December. Having served as a librarian in the eastern part of North Carolina for seven years, Hardison learned about the Macon County library position opening and applied, knowing that she and her husband had the desire to get closer to North Georgia family members. Both Hardison and her husband, Jim, have a history of visiting Franklin as children.

"It just all came together," said Hardison. "I'm incredibly excited about this opportunity and feel very privileged to be in this position. I'm also thrilled to be a part of the community."

Hardison earned her master's in library sciences from East Carolina University. One of her first main tasks will be overseeing the Nantahala Library project – to move the small library adjacent to the Nantahala School into its own facility, a building purchased by Macon County.

"We're hopeful that will happen by mid-2023," said Hardison. "[Macon County] is a vibrant and diverse community, and my priority will be to continue to provide vibrant and diverse materials," she said.

Appalachian Trail length extended by 8.4 miles

The total length of the Appalachian Trail (A.T.) typically changes slightly periodically – sometimes annually – due to footpath relocations and more precise measurement techniques. An end-of-2022-approved increase was due to three significant detours/relocations in New York and Maine, and a series of more precise measurements in Massachusetts and Connecticut. Thus, the A.T. was extended from 2,190 miles to 2,198.4 miles.

The national Appalachian Trail Conservancy, for which there is a local group – Franklin A.T. Community Council – reported that the detour was implemented in the spring of 2022 to bypass a dangerous road crossing over the heavily trafficked Palisades Interstate Parkway in New Jersey. Completed in 1937, the A.T. is the longest hiking-only footpath in the world and travels through 14 states along the crests and valleys of the Appalachian Mountain Range, from its southern terminus at Springer Mountain, Ga.,

to the northern terminus at Katahdin, Me. As a unit of the National Park System, the A.T. is managed under a partnership between public and private sectors led by the Appalachian Trail Conservancy.

Accessible near Franklin off Highway 64 at the Winding Stair pass, more than three million people hike the A.T. annually, and over 3,000 people from the United States and internationally attempt to "thru-hike" the entire footpath in a

single year.


Also new for the A.T. is the opening of a seasonal potable water source at Anthony Wayne Recreation Area in Bear Mountain, N.Y. The route across the Palisades Interstate Parkway overpass is the official A.T. route until a new permanent crossing is developed.



Panthers winter sports season near mid-point with mixed results

Basketball has tough night vs. Pisgah Bears Three of the four Franklin High School (FHS) basketball squads boast winning records as of mid-December. FHS began its regular season Nov. 29 after numerous scrimmages for both junior varsity and varsity women's and men's teams. On Dec. 16 they hosted Pisgah for the eighth of 20 regular season games, plus a New Year's weekend tournament. The games against the Bears were tough with only the men's varsity team coming out on top, in a hard-fought 77-71 win. Prior to the game against North Henderson on Dec. 20, the current cumulative record stands at 21-9; 6-1 in the 3A Conference 54. Men's varsity, coached by Doug Plemmons and Jay Brooks, lead the way at 8-1 overall followed by the junior varsity (JV) women who hold a 6-1 record and are coached by Bekah and Josh Brooks. Next come the JV men who stand at 5-2, coached by Tres Rogers and Ryan Raby. Last, but not least, the varsity women's team is 3-5 and guided by Scott Hartbarger and Justin Moffitt.

In terms of per game statistics for the varsity teams, senior Tori Ensley leads women's scoring in both points and steals (13.9 and 2 respectively). Junior Avery Moffitt is first in shooting percentage at 45% with sophomore Cali Queen leading in assists at 2.5, and junior Breonna Carver averaging almost one block in each game she has played. The team leader in rebounds is senior Roslynn McCollum (6).

As for the men's program, senior Cal Drake is far and away the star player, leading in five categories: Scoring (19.2), shooting percent-

age (48%), assists (2.3), rebounds (9.8), and blocks (1.8). Senior Parker Cabe leads the way in steals at 3.3 a game.

With plenty of regular season and then conference and potentially state playoffs remaining, coaches are generally happy with what they have seen from the teams so far this year. Men's varsity Coach Plem-

mons offers some reasons for his boys' success.

"While individual stats are important ... they practice and play extremely hard, defensively they are holding opponents under 50 points per game on average, and lastly, this team is very unselfish ... they don't seem to care who receives credit as long as the outcome of the game is on our favor."

Similarly, Hartbarger lauded the effort his varsity women have demonstrated.

"They battled both Cherokee and Rabun County, who are both leading their confer-

ences. I am proud of the girls' effort and steps they are taking; we fought hard against Pisgah and are getting better every game. We have had a string of tough games and playing good teams also."

Next up for Panther basketball is the Towns

County Christmas Tournament Dec. 28-30 with specific game times still to be determined.

Update: Franklin High School closed out its 2022 home basketball schedule Dec. 20, with the men's varsity team winning a thrilling triple overtime win against North Henderson, 96-92. The hard fought victory ended an evening during which all four basketball squads prevailed over their Scarlet Knight opponents. The impressive win leaves the Panthers men first in conference play with North Henderson in third, and West Henderson in second. FHS' next home game, Jan.10 is against the Falcons.

Swimming program logs last meet of 2022

Dwain and Dina Picou led the FHS swim team to Buncombe County Dec. 16 for the second of three scheduled meets there - this one, a five-team contest at the TCR Invitational. Participating schools included TC Roberson, Asheville, West Henderson, and Smoky Mountain high schools. For the first time this season, the Panthers did not come away with first place - in either men's or women's rankings for a meet. Instead, host TC Roberson took first: 384 points for the women and 347 for the men. The Panthers logged a third-place finish for the women, with 251 points, just behind second place Asheville who

finished a close second with 381 points. For the men, FHS finished second with 222. Coaches Dwain and Dina Picou were happy with the overall results, nonetheless.

"TC Roberson and Asheville high schools are both 4A (as compared to FHS being 3A, which is one level lower/smaller school) and are two of the fastest teams in Asheville," they said. While a few swimmers were missing for different reasons, "we had a good number of our swimmers beat their best times and some of our relays had faster regional qualifying times."


Some individual standouts include senior Clayton Guynn taking first place in both the boys 50- and 100-yard freestyle races, (out of 18 and 9 contenders respectively) and Jose Gomez (junior) coming in third for the boys 100 yard butterfly. On the women's side, junior Logan Guynn finished third in the girl's 100 yard breaststroke while Natalie Ballard, also a junior, finished second in both the girl's 50- and 500-yard freestyle events. Sophomore Zoi Walker came in second for the girls 200 yard individual medley event, which includes butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke, and freestyle swims. In the girls 200 yard freestyle relay, the team of Walker, Kate Phillips, Callie Roper, and Rylee Cassada took first place for the Panthers. Cassada, Phillips, Guynn and Ballard also brought home third place in the girls 400 yard freestyle relay.

The next scheduled meet for FHS swim-

mers is Friday, Jan. 13, 2023. It will again be held at Buncombe County Schools and will consist of six schools competing.

Wrestling update

In wrestling, the Panthers recently competed in the Great Smoky Mountain Grapple, held at Harrah's Cherokee Center, Asheville Dec. 16 and 17. The meet included 34 men's and 23 women's teams from North Carolina, Georgia and South Carolina high schools. On the heels of the recent quad meet here in Franklin, Head Coach Coley Tyler was accentuating the positive. "We cut down on the number of losses by pin on Tuesday (Dec. 13 FHS-hosted meet), which was great to see after all the work and emphasis we have put on that in practice. We did better against every team the second time around, which is a testament to growth and improvement." "We had six of our nine wrestlers make it to day two on Saturday [at Asheville]. The Panthers' Abby Carpenter (girls 126-lb. weight class), was again a standout on the team with a firstplace finish where she scored 24 team points. Carpenter won three matches, all by falls, over North Henderson (quarterfinal), Rosman (semifinal), and Mitchell (final). FHS rolls into the Christmas break with three more matches this week; one at North Henderson, Dec. 20, and two at Swain Dec. 22 (individual tournament) and Dec. 23 (duals tournament).



What's new on the plateau

I know Santa is making his list and checking it twice; and I'm making a list also, a list of things the town will do next year.

First, the board and staff will begin the annual budget development process at the beginning of the next year. Like always the town will address some very big and expensive items.

Second, one huge item on a wish list will be the replacement of the water pre-clarifier tank at the water plant. The tank was built along with the plant back in the 1960s. The tank is on its last leg of service, and a replacement tank will cost somewhere around \$2.5 to 3 million.

This past spring, town staff submitted a grant request to the state for funds to build a new tank, along with a grant to replace waterlines and a water tank on Dog Mountain. The \$3 million grant for the Dog Mountain project was approved; however, the pre-clarifier tank project was not approved. Staff and consulting engineers have resubmitted the grant request for a second round of review. We are hopeful the town will be awarded full or partial funding. An alternative would be for the state to grant an interest free loan, as we have received in the past. Such a government loan is tantamount to receiving free money.

Third, in the budget review process the staff and board will also be funding several more road paving projects based on need and priority. On another positive note, the repaving activity should begin to decrease as the town has been aggressively repaving roads in the past few years.

Fourth, at the beginning of the new year a review of sidewalk projects will be initiated. The proposed sidewalk on NC 106 from the shopping center to Cobb Road will continue to be developed. It is a top item on my wish list for the town. There are a number of potential funding sources that could make this project a reality in a rather fast period. I am excited about creative ways to potentially fund the sidewalk instead of relying on NCDOT prioritization funding that could take years.

Fifth, but not last, on many people's wish list is installation of downtown electric vehicle charging stations. One idea I have is for the town government to transition to is electric town vehicles where feasible. I believe our light duty vehicle fleet could go electric in the near term. In the long run the electric vehicles could become very cost effective from both a maintenance and fueling perspective.

Next year will be a full and busy, but for now let me just say to you Merry Christmas and Happy Hanukkah.


Nuisance dog ordinance does need to be addressed



Christmas wreaths laid at state veterans cemetery

National Wreaths Across America Day is honored each December in coordination with wreath-laying ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery. The purpose is to remember fallen U.S. veterans, as well as to honor those who serve; and teach the children of this great country the value of freedom.

On Monday, Dec. 17, at 11 a.m., approximately 100 volunteers gathered at the Western Carolina State Veterans Cemetery in Black Mountain to lay a wreath on each grave in the cemetery. After the wreaths were placed on the graves, a ceremony was conducted at 12 noon in front of the Chapel where the U.S. and the military flags are displayed. Military and ROTC served as the Honor Guard presenting flags. Members of the Revolutionary War Reenactment Unit fired the gun salute, followed by a second gun salute by a military unit. Military veterans and active duty, and ROTC members placed wreaths at each military branch flag. The ceremony concluded with taps.

Jack and Connie Southard participated this year because Jack's brother, William Kent Southard, was buried there, in the Vietnam Section, on Sept. 12, 2022. There are 6,100 veterans buried in the Western Carolina State Veterans Cemetery. The volunteers were instructed to place wreaths on every other grave as the group only had just over 3,400 wreaths to place.

After the wreaths were placed, many of the volunteers were in tears because so many graves were with-

out wreaths. Since Jack's brother Kent was buried there in September, at least 20 new graves have appeared in the Vietnam Section. NASCAR celebrates 75 years of stock car racing this December

NASCAR Wire Service

Dec. 14, is one of the most significant dates in NASCAR's history.

On December 14, 1947, Bill France Sr. gathered 35 of the most influential figures in racing at Daytona's Streamline Hotel to share his vision of a more prosperous future for their beloved sport.

As 'Big Bill' set the foundation of the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing into motion that day, he was quoted as telling the group:

"Stock car racing has got distinct possibilities for Sunday shows and we do not know how big it can be if it's handled properly... It can go the same way as big car racing (Indianapolis), I believe stock car racing can become a nationally recognized sport by having a National Point Standing. Stock car racing as we've been running it is not, in my opinion, the answer... We must try to get track owners and promoters interested in building stock car racing up. We are all interested in one thing — that is improving the present conditions. The answer lies in our group right here today to do it."

In the last 75 years, NASCAR has expanded globally, with series in the U.S., Mexico, Canada, Brazil and Europe, and has produced some of the best drivers in motorsports.

NASCAR History

Since its inception as the Strictly Stock Division, what is now the NASCAR Cup Series has evolved into one of the most popular sports in the world. In the beginning, the race cars were driven off the street and onto the track, but as safety technology advanced, changes were made to cars, as the racing machines of today are more complicated and technological than ever. NASCAR has grown with the series from the small organization formed on the sands of Daytona Beach to a thriving sport.

Key milestones in the history of NASCAR

– DECEMBER 14, 1947 – Bill France Sr. organizes a meeting at the Streamline Hotel in Daytona Beach, Fla., to discuss the future of stock car racing. NASCAR, the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing, is conceived.

– FEBRUARY 15, 1948 – NASCAR runs its first race in Daytona Beach at the beach road course. Red Byron wins in a Ford.

– JUNE 19, 1949 – The first NASCAR "Strictly Stock" (current NASCAR Cup Series) race is held at Charlotte (N.C.) Fairgrounds Speedway. Jim Roper wins the race, Bob Flock wins the first pole and Sara Christian, who finishes 14th, is credited as the first woman to race in NASCAR's premier division.

- OCTOBER 16, 1949 – Red Byron wins the first NASCAR Strictly Stock championship. In 1959, Jim France, son of Bill France Sr., joins the staff at International Speedway Corporation (ISC). He worked in all phases of operation in his early years of the company and moved up to serve as vice chairman/executive vice president of NASCAR before ultimately being named Chairman.

- FEBRUARY 22, 1959 - The high-banked 2.5-mile Day-

tona International Speedway hosts the first Daytona 500. More than 41,000 fans are in attendance for the inaugural event in which the winner isn't decided until 61 hours after the checkered flag flies, as the result of a dramatic photo finish. Lee Petty is declared the winner by two feet after conclusive evidence from a newsreel is reviewed by Bill France Sr.

– DECEMBER 1, 1963 – Wendell Scott becomes the first African-American to win a race in NASCAR's premier series, beating Buck Baker at Jacksonville (Fla.) Speedway. In 1970, Lesa France Kennedy, daughter of Bill France Jr., joins the staff at International Speedway Corporation (ISC). Instrumental in the growth of ISC and the advancement of motorsports, she has moved up to serve as vice chairperson of NASCAR and vice chairperson of the Board of Directors for ISC.



– JANUARY 10, 1972 – The founder of NASCAR, Bill France Sr., hands over the reins of leadership to his son Bill France Jr., who becomes the second president in NASCAR's history.

- FEBRUARY 20, 1977 – Janet Guthrie becomes the first woman to compete in the Daytona 500. She qualifies 39th and finishes 12th.

- FEBRUARY 18, 1979 – CBS presents the first live flagto-flag coverage of a 500-mile NASCAR event with the Daytona 500, a show not soon to be forgotten as Richard Petty avoids an incident between Cale Yarborough and Donnie Allison on the last lap to win the race. With Petty racing by to take the checkered flag, Yarborough, Donnie Allison and Bobby Allison are involved in a fight in the infield grass, between Turns 3 and 4.

– NOVEMBER 18, 1979 – Richard Petty wins his record seventh series championship.

– JULY 4, 1984 – Richard Petty earns his 200th win in the Firecracker 400 at Daytona International Speedway, setting a mark that has yet to be challenged.

It is Richard Petty's last race and Jeff Gordon's first in NASCAR premier series competition. Five drivers are eligible to win the title as the race began. Driver-owner Alan Kulwicki ends up leading one more lap than Bill Elliott, to earn the five-point bonus for leading the most laps – and win the championship by 10 points.

- AUGUST 6, 1994 – The series schedule expands to include the famed 2.5-mile Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Jeff Gordon claims the win in the first Brickyard 400.

- OCTOBER 23, 1994 - Dale Earnhardt joins Richard Petty as the second driver in series history to win seven NASCAR series championships clinching the title at Rockingham, N.C.

– JANUARY 2003 – NASCAR unveils the NASCAR Research and Development Center in Concord, N.C.

- 2004 - NASCAR begins its first season under the banner of Nextel, with the series becoming known as the NASCAR NEXTEL Cup (now the NASCAR Cup) Series. A new format is implemented to determine the series champion and is known as the Chase for the NASCAR NEXTEL Cup (now NASCAR NEXTEL Cup (now NASCAR Cup Series Playoffs).

- MAY 23, 2010 - The in-

augural NASCAR Hall of Fame class is inducted in Charlotte, N.C.: Bill France Sr., Bill France Jr., Richard Petty, Dale Earnhardt and Junior Johnson.

- FEBRUARY 17, 2013 – Danica Patrick makes history by winning the Busch Pole Award for the 2013 Daytona 500, becoming the first female to win a pole in NASCAR premier series history.

– JANUARY 30, 2014 – NASCAR Chairman Brian France announces championship format change, virtually guaranteeing a berth in the NASCAR playoffs for each race winner. Key among the changes is a 'Championship 4' finale where the highest finisher among the four eligible drivers at Homestead-Miami Speedway would be crowned champion. – NOVEMBER 20, 2016 – Jimmie Johnson makes history with his record-tying seventh NASCAR premier series title; joining NASCAR Hall of Famers Richard Petty and Dale Earnhardt as the series leaders with seven championships.

– DECEMBER 1, 2016 – NASCAR and Monster Energy announce a multi-year agreement for the premier series entitlement as well as the prestigious annual NASCAR All-Star Race. Monster Energy, began its tenure as naming rights partner on Jan. 1, 2017, will become only the third company to serve as the entitlement sponsor in NASCAR premier series history, following RJ Reynolds and Sprint/Nextel.

- 2017 - NASCAR introduces a new three-stage format of racing across all three national series racing. On the eve of Daytona Speedweeks, Kennedy unveils a flagship tenant,

Bass Pro Shops, at ISC's ONE DAYTONA, a 300,000-square foot premier mixed-use and entertainment destination across the street from Daytona.

– APRIL 27, 2018 – In a move designed to strengthen a relationship that dates back more than 60 years, NASCAR announces the acquisition of the Automobile Racing Club of America. Both NASCAR and ARCA, a Midwest-based sanctioning body for stock car auto racing, share a long history: ARCA founder John Marcum raced against Bill

He grew up in the early years of stock car racing, living and learning every detail of the sport from his own experiences, and from his father Bill France Sr., the founder and first president of NASCAR, and brother Bill Jr., NASCAR's former president, chairman and CEO.


